article with a clearer picture of the direction you are heading. Sure, life becomes a little easier when you do not have to attend classes and take exams. The fact of the matter is that you still have to turn in assignments and report to campus every three weeks. This portion of the program also requires a financial investment. During the final on-campus course of the program, you will be required to submit proof of the following; membership to the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, a copy of your car insurance card and registration, proof of health insurance, a drug screen, a background check, a health check-up, and up-to-date vaccinations. These items are important because they are basic requirements for working in the field. Be prepared to contact your health insurance company to verify coverage. If you do not have health insurance see Student Services for available options.

The rotations are full time but the hours are dependent on your preceptors' availability. This means that you may not be able to work that full time job you have been balancing with school or you may have to adjust your hours with your employer. You may also have to stay at your site later, arrive earlier, and you will work on a weekend. It is vital to keep in mind that this is a learning experience so the more time you spend at your site the more you will gain. Try to go the extra mile in everything you do, ask if they need assistance and if you have a question do not hesitate to ask. Several students are offered jobs after their rotation so be sure you make a lasting impression.

The supervised practice portion can become intense when you are in the clinical rotations so make sure you pay close attention during class and do not just memorize but rather absorb and apply all the material that is presented. When you go to your site take as many notes as you can, I promise they will help you out with assignments and throughout your rotation. I have been very fortunate to have great preceptors. I was also able to network and form a bond with the employees at each facility. Again, you never know who you can meet so always be friendly and get know everyone. Be sure to keep a positive mental attitude, not just throughout your classes or supervised practice but your entire life. This program is not a means to an end, it is an experience that will allow you to flourish the rest of

vour life. At last, I would like to leave you with one of my favorite quotes "negative thinking is mental malpractice." - Dr. Robert Anthony
