Verb Tenses

Verbs communicate the actions of sentences. To use verbs effectively in your writing, try to be mindful of issues like <u>tense</u> and <u>subject and verb agreement</u>.

Tenses:

1. Use the past tense to discuss outside research.

Example: "Alin Richardson (2017) found not all Yuccan birds migrate South in January.

2. Use present tense when discussing conclusions, limitations, and future directions.

Example: "My research shows that students perform better when given test strategies."

Keep your verb tenses consistent. If you use past tense, try to continue the past tense in the same paragraph or next paragraphs to help the reader follow along.

Subject and Verb Agreement:

1. Use singular verbs along with singular subjects.

Example: "The average of test results decreases as we add more subjects."

2. Use plural verbs along with plural subjects.

Example: "The marks in experiment 1, including the double-blind testing rounds, increase in overall accuracy."

Your subject and verb must both be either singular or plural. If you are confused about whether your subject is singular or plural, try to disregard phrases like "together with," "including," or "as well as."
