Staff Spotlight: Testing Coordinator, Chris Noucakis



A FINANCIAL RESET FOR 2025

Hello 2025! While we set our financial sights on a new year, we continue to see everything from eggs, to gasoline, to clothing, to our electric bill cost us more money. Our dollar seems to cover less and less. With that in mind, how do we make the money we have stretch further?

It's time to re-evaluate and reset our budget. We don't necessarily have to cut out or down on everything we do, but where can we make some adjustments to make sure everything we need to cover financially is handled.

Wondering where to start? Begin with the Short-Term Financial Goals. These goals typically are less complicated to complete and generally more manageable. Anything from saving for an emergency fund, paying down a credit card or other debt, saving for a special item, or making sure you are breaking-even at the end of the month/budgeting period. Your goals depend on your personal (family) financial status. Create these goals with the SMART principles in mind to set you on your path.

The SMART principles:

Specific – very clearly defined;

Measurable – has check-points to show progress;

Attainable – a goal that you can complete and is not out of reach;

Relevant – goal is yours (and your family's) and important to your financial health:

Time-Framed – you have a time to complete it (3 months, 6 months, 12 months).

Next, determine your income, identify expenses (ALL of them), and create a simple budget. This is your roadmap to completing your financial objectives. View your budget as a guide to your money and not a restrictive document. A way for you to tell your money what to do versus wondering what happened to it all. But don't forget to treat yourself (even if it's a small treat) within your budget. Your short-term goals should drive this budget.

If you've never created a budget before, it might be frustrating initially and the first attempt may not be successful, and that's okay. If you learn from the mistakes and apply them to the next budget, it will be more effective. Plus, there are plenty of FREE tools available to take advantage of that can assist you along the way.

It's not a document set in stone, it will change and refine itself over time. The more you use it, the more effective the budget will become, and you will see your goals nearing completion.

Attention Student Loan Borrowers!

If you hold federal direct Unsubsidized loans, interest will start to accrue on those loans from the time they are disbursed. Federal direct Subsidized loans will continue to have interest paid by the federal government while you remain a student above ½ time (in-school deferment) or are on a deferment period such as grace period.

Please register for the free website https://portal.iontuition.com to track your loans; know your servicer, review interest rates and accrual as it restarts, understand repayment plans/options, as well as deferment, forbearance, and consolidation.

Call of Duty

In order to stay competitive with universities that have much larger enrollment numbers than ours, we combine forces with other Keiser eSports programs (Pembrooke Pines, Jacksonville, Daytona, Lakeland, New Port Richey) and form a "cross-campus" team. Brandon "Osiris" Gallart and Austin "Zodi" Sales were representing the Sarasota campus and made-up half of the four-man roster.

The team competed in the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) where they cruised to a 7-1 overall record in the regular season. The lone loss came at the hands of in-state rival Florida Atlantic University. In the quarterfinals of playoffs, we swept New England Institute of Technology 3-0, followed by a 3-o victory over Fisher College in the semifinals. The stage was set – we would play Florida Atlantic University for the ECAC championship! This time around, we got the better of them in a 3-1 victory and were crowned champions!



Captain Austin Sales had this to say about the team's performance, "hard work and trust got us to a championship in the fall." Looking ahead, the Call of Duty team will compete in the Collegiate Call of Duty League (CCL) this spring and hope to build on last year's results, "we were the best college Call of Duty team in Florida last year, and we want to cement that status and more in the spring."

Rocket League

After acquiring two of Florida's top high school Rocket League players last summer, we had high hopes for the team coming into the fall. It's safe to say that this team lived up to the hype!

The team featured Bryan "Zinvez" Munoz (freshman),

Devin "Denzy" DiCarlo (freshman) and Samuel "Prism" Sotelo (sophomore).

After a dominant 7-0 record in the regular season, we defeated Colombia College in the quarterfinals and Edgewood College in the semifinals.

That set up a championship matchup against Rochester Institute of Technology.

Keiser came out on top with a 4-2 series victory and were crowned ECAC Champions!

Captain Munoz described the fall season as euphoric.

"We floated through nine weeks

without losing a single series and capped it off with a trophy.

Winning in our first semester as a team surpassed our expectations, and our goal is to continue pushing through the collegiate Rocket League scene in the spring together, proving why we're a top team in the country."




League of Legends

Our League of Legends team took a big step forward in the fall season. They had a phenomenal start to the season; at one point they were a combined 7-1 between the ECAC league and the National Association of Collegiate eSports league. Multiple mid-season roster changes were difficult to overcome for the team, but they had playoff appearances in both leagues.

Key victories included wins over the University of Kansas and Milwaukee School of Engineering. The starting roster consisted of Stevo "Hazel" Blagojevic, Mike Lyons, Dymitri "Kyaro" Sexton, Matthew Matikonis and Lawrence "Scoffer" Wu. Main contributors off the bench included Ian "QuarterMaster" Przybylowicz and Dante Stabile.

We made playoffs in two tournaments simultaneously, while



having to reassemble the team. I believe we have the potential to become champions in the upcoming spring season."
