- Manage food service systems
- Provide nutrition education
- Conduct research

Work the RDN

- Plan food and nutrition programs
- Supervise meal preparation
- Oversee the serving of meals
- Prevent and treat illnesses by promoting healthy eating and recommending dietary modifications

How to Become a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist

- Education:
 - Minimum of a Bachelors degree in dietetics/nutrition
 - Dietetic Supervised Practice (internship)
- Must pass national registration exam to legally use the title "Registered Dietitian" or "Registered Dietitian Nutritionist"
- Must complete continuing education credits throughout their career


